

Chairman's Message

Now, more than ever, the children and young people of Australia need our help to make safer and healthier choices.

In 2016/17 we delivered our program to 710,000 children in schools right across the nation. That's 115,000 children more than participated 4 years ago when we set a base from which we have since grown significantly.

This growth in program participation is clear evidence of the relevance and usefulness of the Life Education program to schools and their students, their teachers and their parents. When we have the opportunity to expand the delivery of our program, because we have the sustainable funding to do so, we are able to generate demand for the program from schools keen to take advantage of the support we can provide their community.

Why? Because of the critical relevance of our work in these local school communities.

One of the highest priorities for parents in these communities is that their children grow up developing safe and healthy habits – that they develop the wellbeing necessary for them to live active and fulfilling lives. I have been associated with the work of Life Education for 30 years. Our recent growth and development is some of the most meaningful and exciting that I have witnessed over this period. We are better placed now than we have ever been to ensure this priority gets the attention it deserves.

I was fortunate enough to know our founder, Ted Noffs, and feel confident that he would be well pleased with the manner in which we are giving expression to his vision for our work. Ted was motivated by a core belief in the uniqueness and specialness of each and every child – that each was a marvel full of awesome possibility. And our responsibility was to provide them every opportunity to truly understand this – to understand the importance of caring for their body, their mind and their spirit if their humanity was to flourish – if they were to fully express their unique potential.

We have come a long way from the first Life Education classroom developed by Ted and his supporters in the Wayside Chapel in Sydney's Kings Cross in 1979. The extent to which we have succeeded in delivering such a unique and valued educational experience, year on year, to so many young Australians – over 6 million when last estimated – is testimony to the power and relevance of our founder's vision and the perseverance and hard work of our CEO David Ballhausen and all our staff, volunteers, and supporters. I offer my sincere thanks to you all.



Together with a number of my colleagues, I will shortly be retiring as Chairman and stepping down from the Board – this being a requirement of our Constitution. I want to acknowledge Paul Siviour, Lyn Thurnham and Clare Payne, who have provided long standing service to the organisation as fellow Directors. I also acknowledge Alan Cadman (NSW) and Mike McAuliffe (WA) who, in addition to service on the National Board, have also provided leadership over a considerable period at the State level.

There is a positive momentum developing across the organisation as we seek to build on our relevance to society, our position as the largest and most trusted provider of health and drug education to Australia's children, and the opportunity we have to significantly grow our reach and impact. I encourage everyone associated with this important work to remain committed and continue to work hard. I wish you all the very hest of luck.

How Life Education works

Our program comprises a significant array of purpose built, issue specific, age appropriate resources for use by our Educators, the Class Teacher and parents, as well as the students themselves. The program is designed to be delivered to small class groups at least once a year, every year, over the course of a student's schooling, inclusive of their preschool years.






Program Delivery

We continued to generate strong growth in student participation in our program in 2016/17.





In 2017/18 we expect to deliver our program to more than 735,000 school children across Australia.





Teacher Evaluation summary

Over 1,000 teachers responded to a 22 item online questionnaire undertaken after the program had been delivered, and post visit activities had been completed. Here are some of the results that demonstrate that Life Education plays an invaluable role in helping young people make safer and healthier choices



New in 2016 / 17

As children head back to school amid renewed concerns about cyber-bullying, Life Education announced the launch of its new program module, **Relate Respect Connect**, aimed at teaching children aged 10-13 how to build safe and respectful relationships. The launch of the program received significant media and public interest with Life Education featured on television, radio, online and print news channels.



RELATE RESPECT CONNECT

Years 5 - 6

A unique, contemporary module that explores building positive, safe and respectful relationships. Presented via a series of fictitious video blogs that resonate with young people moving through upper primary school and beyond this module focuses on:

- · understanding how to respect ourselves and others
- · identifying characteristics of positive relationships
- · strategies to help maintain positive online and offline relationships
- · strategies to respond to unsafe or disrespectful situations online and offline
- the importance of relationships to our own and others wellbeing

This brings to a conclusion a concerted investment program undertaken over the last 2-3 years, that has seen us comprehensively refresh and upgrade our preschool and primary school program content. In addition to the resources used by our own Educators, supporting their work with class groups, a major effort has been made to create a suite of 'best in class' online resources to be used by the class teacher, prior to, and post our school visit.

Thanks to funding from Bio Island we have recently created new online teacher resources for our middle primary school module – *Mind Your Medicine*.



MIND YOUR MEDICINE

Years 3 - 4

Using a friendly game show format *Mind Your Medicine* develops students' understanding of medicines and their safe use, positive communication, strategies for managing conflict, stress, and bullying and explores how feelings influence the choices that we make.

- factors that influence someone's sense of self-worth
- techniques for effective communication
- identifying the impact of different factors on health and wellbeing
- strategies for managing stressful situations
- medicines as drugs & the consequences of their misuse

The Raymond E Purves Foundation supported our development of new online teacher resources for our upper primary school module – *Think Twice*.



THINK TWICE

Years 5 - 6

Using distinctive animated and vox-pop videos, this module tackles the topic of drinking alcohol in an age appropriate context. Students explore concepts such as the effect that alcohol has on body systems, myths and facts about alcohol, laws relating to its sale and reasons why people choose not to consume alcohol.

- myths and facts surrounding the use of alcohol
- strategies for responding to encouragement or pressure to drink
- physical, social & legal consequences of alcohol use
- strategies to reduce harmful effects of alcohol on self and others

This has completed this phase of program investment. Our attention now shifts to parents, and how we can better support them to best support the safer and healthier development of their children. We are also keen to look at the opportunity for us to be able to directly and meaningfully engage with the students themselves, day-to-day, beyond the limits of our visit to their school. This is exciting mission-led work, all motivated by the desire to continue to enhance the impact of our work.


Year 5, 6 and 7

Why is it important?

Opportunities for students to learn how to treat others with respect helps them to develop pro-social moral values and these, in turn, create a 'moral map' for them to use throughout their lives. Engaging in respectful relationships also assists students to create a self-perception of themselves as 'good people'. The skills needed to build positive and respectful relationships, effective communication, and decision making in social situations are fundamental components for promoting resilience and positive mental health as well as future academic and career success.

Life Education Foundation

Our Financials

The following is a summary of Life Education Group's 2016/17 financial performance:







Life Education Australia (LEA) is a company limited by guarantee. It owns and is responsible for developing the Life Education program (essentially each module and its content, the teacher resources, the student workbook, the parent resources). LEA is also responsible for quality assurance and program evaluation as well as national marketing and partnership activities. The members of LEA include its separately incorporated Affiliated Member organisations – Life Education NSW, Life Education Victoria, Life Education Queensland, Life Education South Australia, Life Education Western Australia and Life Education Northern Territory. The program is delivered across Australia by these Affiliated Members in their respective jurisdictions. As such each Affiliated Member organisation is responsible for employing Educators, developing and maintaining Mobile Classrooms, promoting the program to schools, and overseeing its delivery. The financial information presented above is provided as a guide only. This information has been extracted from the financial statements of the entities comprising the Life Education Group. These consolidated figures have not been audited.

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
